President's Report

Dear colleagues: As 2008 comes to an end, it is time for a retrospective analysis of what IAPD has achieved in the course of this year. In my last report I referred to a number of subjects and goals that had to be addressed. These included finances, expenditure reduction, Regional Meetings,

the promotion of DENFAC, increasing the number of members, and a review of the committee appointment system. Some of these aims were fulfilled but not all, and some pleasant surprises enriched our organization. To be more specific:

1 Our financial situation remained unchanged. We did not find any new sources to increase our income. At this stage professional fund raising is costly to IAPD, and the rise in travel costs in-

non-existent. Only one country applied, but their conditions could not be met.

3 The first Regional Meeting took place in South Africa and, thanks to our members Dr. Janet Gritzman and Dr. Morenike Ukpong, under the guidance of our Secretary Prof. Gerald Wright, we gained about 100 new members for Africa. The valuable contribution of the speakers, Profs. Jens Andreasen and Goran Koch who volunteered to participate in this event without remuneration contributed significantly to the success of this meeting.

Colombia will be our second Regional Meeting, which will be held in April 2009. Due to the extraordinary efforts of our member Dr. Francisco Hernandez, President of the Colombian Society of Pediatric Dentistry, together with the collaboration of our Board member Dr. Jorge Luis Castillo, we foresee another success. Thanks to Dr. Castillo, IAPD set up a booth promoting the Regional Meeting in Colombia at the Latin American Congress (ALOP) in Venezuela. A booth promoting the Colombian Regional Meeting and the IAPD Congress in Munich was also set up at the Brazilian Congress of Dentistry for Babies, in S. Paulo, Brazil, thanks to the kindness of Dr. Pedro Garcia Fernandes, President of the Congress.

As a prelude to a possible Regional Meeting, our Secretary General was invited to Hyderabad, India to discuss this and participate in the 30th ISPPD Meeting. The meeting was well-attended and over 100 new Indian members joined IAPD. For the first time, IAPD now has a significant presence in India.

4 IAPD registered some good results in its efforts to increase the number of individual members and that of National Societies. Non-member countries like Panama, Uruguay, Venezuela, Russia, and Egypt demonstrated genuine interest in joining IAPD and filled out the forms for membership proposal. Professionals from African countries joined IAPD as individual members as a result of their participation in the Regional Meeting that took place in South Africa. Colleagues from Brazil, Israel, Panama and India submitted or promised to send in their application for individual membership.

Through the CEO, Mr. John Rutkauskas, contact has also been made with the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry (AAPD) to promote IAPD. Mr Rutkauskas wrote that he would have no problem in posting periodic updates on IAPD activities, which would be published in the PDT (Newsletter) on a space availability basis. The first update is being prepared and will be sent to the AAPD in early 2009.

5 In addition, IAPD is about to sign a contract with Prof. Jens Andreasen to allow individual IAPD members to access through our website a Trauma Interactive Database (TID), an area that undoubtedly interests dentists worldwide. Each day more professionals demonstrate their interest in becoming IAPD individual members as they realize the benefits our organization is able to provide.

6 Despite our request for IAPD members interested in serving on committees to contact the President Elect or myself, not many members responded. Hence, I personally contacted several members who, in my judgment, could contribute substantially to the different committees. They have fulfilled my expectations and most committees are working efficiently.

Dear friends, I want to emphasize what I wrote earlier: the children of the world need IAPD's help. DENFAC is still our best tool to promote oral health by teaching teachers in less developed countries. We should try to revitalize this excellent project for the benefit of children worldwide. The world is suffering one of the worst financial crises of the century, and it will affect the economy of almost every country. The need for support will grow and the means to provide it will decrease. We have to administer our budget intelligently in order to achieve the maximum results with the limited means at our disposal.

As we start the New Year I wish IAPD a fruitful year, many fine achievements, and for all of our members and their families a

I am not sure how it will affect us, but the currency instability could influence our financial position. It is not something to worry about and once the year-end financial statements are prepared, I will be able to report more on this to the Board and to Council.

This past one and half years has seen more IAPD growth. Eight national societies have written the Secretariat inquiring about becoming members of IAPD. Of this group, two have already submitted application for membership. This means that the IAPD family will grow to more than 50 nations. There also has been growth of Individual membership. In November, Professors Goran Koch and Jens Andreasen delivered lectures at the first IAPD Regional meeting in Johannesburg, South Africa.

The meeting was attended by South Africans as well as those from other African nations and from all reports it was a very successful meeting.


I was invited to Hydera-

Message from the IAPD Editor



At the IAPD Board Meeting in Dubrovnik May 29, 2008, in connection with the EAPD meeting, I presented the IAPD Editor's report compiling Journal events up to that date. It was clear that the quality and number of submitted manuscripts are steadily increasing in quality and the number of submitted manuscript was now about 300 manuscripts a year. The overall circulation had increased by 21% in 2007 com-

pared to 2006. At this occasion a well attended Editorial Board Meeting was held. A number of issues were discussed such as the circulation, downloading of papers from the journal, topics for thematic issues etc. The suggestions from that meeting were then further discussed at the Management Committee Meeting held in Stockholm December 11, 2008, where Göran Dahllöf, Editor-in-Chief; Helen Rodd, Hon. Editor BSPD (by telephone); Göran Koch, Hon. Editor IAPD; and Thomas Trier-Mörk, Wiley-Blackwell were present. The agenda and outcome of this meeting can in short be described as follows:

Editor-in-Chief report: 307 manuscripts were submitted up to December 1 in 2008. Of these 232 had been rejected, 50 accepted, and 24 were pending. The average number of days from submission to final decision was 53 days.

The authors of the manuscripts represented 49 countries. *Publisher's report:* A lot of statistics on circulation and downloads for 2008 were presented and analyzed .In general an increase was seen for all parameters discussed.

Impact factor: A preliminary analysis based on available data showed a good possibility that the IJPD will achieve a good score in the Impact factor list, however, the final results will be released first in June 2009.

Programme in Munich: As a result of the very successful activity on "How to write a manuscript" in the Hong Kong programme the IJPD has been given the possibility to present a programme at the Munich congress. The tentative title is "What is the future for journals in Paediatric Dentistry?" where editors from a number of highly reputable journals are invited to discuss which type of manuscripts will be the most important and attractive in the years to come. Topics for thematic issues: It was decided that the topic for 2010 should be "Dental Anomalies" and the preparations would start immediately.

The meeting was very productive and we all highlighted the excellent work by our Editor-in-Chief Professor Göran Dahllöf, who, to our great pleasure and importance to the IAPD, has accepted to continue as Editor-in-Chief for IJPD.

This year over 130 members & guests attended the meeting on November 13 and 14th, attracted by the unconventional subject" Economy and Caries" and by the reputation and caliber of the speakers. **Prof**, **Marisa Maltz**, *Professor* and Researcher of the Department of Cariology, Faculty of Odontology, Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil presented three lectures entitled: The clinical management of the DISEASE dental caries in the 21th century an evidence based approach. The lectures provided some basic elements of Evidence Based Dentistry and presented examples on the clinical approach of treatment of the disease caries (including mainly non-surgical approach).

This meeting also included several other local speakers: Dr. Rafi Fisher Tel Aviv University: Planning, Admin and Marketing a Dental Practice in the 21th century- the financial aspect of a dental office.

Mr. Itzik Aroya – Financial Consultant: Pension savings on a changing market- all you wanted to know and didn't dare asking.

Speakers from The Hadassah School of Dental Medicine Hebrew University, Jerusalem included Dr. Elinor Alperson, Dr. Esti Davidovitz, and Dr. Ravit Barenboim, who presented: Oral and dental health of children with Aids and HIV carriers in Ethiopia. A most interesting presentation where Dr. Barenboim described her impressions of treating children living in an orphanage.

Obituary of Manuel M. Album



Dr. Manuel Moses Album, a past president of IAPD, resided in Jenkintown, Pa., from 1953 to 2006, when he moved to an assisted living facility in Edgewater, NJ. Dr Album was recognized nationally and internationally as a compassionate and innovative Pediatric Dentist and teacher for nearly half a century.

Upon returning home from World War II in 1946, he opened an office in center city Philadelphia for a short period of time prior to moving the practice to Abington. In addition, for four decades he taught residents at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP). After he retired, Dr. Album enjoyed traveling and golf, but continued to give clinics for children with Cerebral Palsy and to lecture to the dental residents at Abington Hospital and to the students at the University of Pennsylvania School of Dental Medicine.

A world authority on the dental treatment and care of the special patient with disabilities, Dr. Album published more than 100 articles and developed practice techniques that inspired hundreds of residents in the Dental Department at CHOP, many of whom convened annually to honor Dr. Album after he retired. As President of the American Society of Dentistry for Children in 1968, Dr. Album established an international scholarship for a non-U.S. citizen to come to the United States to study Pediatric Dentistry at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. In addition, Dr. Album served as Clinical Professor of Pediatric Dentistry at the School of Dental Medicine, University of Pennsylvania, and served simultaneously on the staff of Abington Hospital, where he remained from 1953 until his death.

His interest in the handicapped patient led him to be the founder and first president of the American Academy of Dentistry for Persons with Disabilities in 1952. He was also instrumental in founding the International Association of Dentistry for the Handicapped and served as its president from 1976-1978. He established the first postgraduate program in the country for dental care for the patients with disabilities at the University of Pennsylvania in 1952. The first dental clinic in the country to teach and train dental students on patients with disabilities was also established at Penn.

He attended Temple University, earned his dental degree from Temple Dental School in 1943, went on to serve with the Army Air Force 238 Medical Dispensary Aviation attached to the 7th Bomb Group, in the China-Burma-India Theater in World War II.

Upon his retirement from private practice, he was given a special day by his former dental residents at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and his many friends, at which time he received a citation from the City of Philadelphia by Mayor Ed Rendell, who praised Dr. Album for his pioneering programs throughout the world in providing dental care for children with special needs.

Dr. Album passed away on 29th November 2008. He was 89 yrs old. He is survived by his wife Shirley Evelyn Israel whom he married in 1951, son Michael J. Album, daughter Fredlyn Album Heller, son-in-law Scott D. Heller, daughter-in-law Kelly Album and grandchildren Sophie Emma Heller, Amelia Laura Heller, Maxwell Jacob Album and Katie LaMotta Album.

The following positions for the IAPD Board are open to nomination: President Elect, Sec. General, Honorary Editor and Three Representatives of the Nations

As Chair of the nominations committee I have contacted the Board members eligible for a further term in the Board to determine their interest in continuing in their present position. From them, the Secretary General, Professor Gerald Wright, the Representatives of the Nations, Professor WE Van Amerongen and Professor Jorge Luis Castillo informed me in writing, their willingness to serve another term in their present position.

According to the IAPD Constitution and By-Laws, nominations for **new members** of the Board of Directors may be made either by a National Member-Society and supported by a second National Member-Society or may be proposed by the President of the IAPD, Board of Directors and supported by two National Member-Societies. Nominations for new Board members should be made on the Association's nomination form. Every nomination form should be accompanied by a letter, in which a statement is made ensuring that the nominee has a sufficient knowledge of and ability to communicate in English, in

It is preferable that those letters to be attached to the nomination proposal. **Existing Board members** eligible for re-election **do not require** re-nomination by National Member Societies. They require, however, a simple nomination by the President of the Board.

The new representative of the Nations will have the responsibility for the IAPD website and needs to have, in addition to a good command of English, the technical knowledge to work with the IAPD IT firm in developing and maintaining the website.

All documentation should be sent by written letter or fax to the Secretariat by the 17th of April 2009, at the latest, that is 60 days before the Council meeting in Munich.

The Secretariat will then send copies to the Secretary General and to the Chair of the Nominations Committee.
